



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NSS Volunteers Advocating for Stray Dogs



NSS volunteers address the condition of Stray Dogs

Report:

On 28th September 2019, the National Service Scheme (NSS) unit organized a thoughtful and inspiring campaign titled "**Compassion for All: Caring for Stray Lives**" at Akbarpur Majra, the village adopted by the NSS. The program was conducted with the aim of fostering a sense of responsibility and care for stray animals among the villagers and participants. With 7 NSS volunteers taking the lead, the event sought to create awareness about the humane treatment of stray animals, their role in the ecosystem, and the community's role in ensuring their welfare. The program began promptly at **10:00 AM** with an introductory session led by the NSS volunteers. The volunteers welcomed the villagers and introduced the theme, emphasizing the importance of compassion and inclusiveness towards all living beings. They shared real-life examples of the challenges stray animals face, including hunger, disease, and mistreatment, and how community-driven care can transform their lives. The opening session set the stage for a day filled with empathy, learning, and action, urging the attendees to view stray animals as an integral part of their environment deserving respect and care.

The first segment of the event was an awareness talk highlighting the need for

collective action in addressing the challenges faced by stray animals. The volunteers used simple but impactful language to convey the importance of compassion and how caring for stray lives fosters harmony between humans and animals. They also discussed practical ways to help stray animals, such as providing food, water, and shelter, and ensuring their health through vaccination and sterilization programs. The talk was interactive, with many villagers expressing their curiosity and willingness to contribute to the welfare of stray animals.

The second part of the program involved a **live demonstration on feeding and caring for stray animals**. The volunteers showcased simple techniques for providing nutritional food and clean water to stray dogs and cats. They also distributed feeding bowls and packets of animal food to encourage villagers to take immediate action. This hands-on session helped demystify the process of caring for stray animals, showing how even small acts of kindness can make a significant difference. The participants, especially children, were excited to learn and pledged to replicate these practices in their daily lives.

A key highlight of the event was a **medical camp for stray animals**, organized in collaboration with a local veterinary clinic. The camp focused on vaccinating stray dogs and providing basic medical care for sick or injured animals in the village. The veterinary team, along with NSS volunteers, explained the importance of vaccinations in preventing diseases such as rabies and conducted sterilization awareness to control the stray animal population humanely. Several villagers brought stray animals from their vicinity to the camp, demonstrating their willingness to participate actively in the initiative.

To inspire long-term commitment to stray animal welfare, the volunteers conducted a **storytelling session** where participants shared personal anecdotes about their experiences with stray animals. Many villagers narrated heartwarming stories of how they had cared for stray animals or how stray dogs had been loyal protectors of their homes. These stories emphasized the mutual bond of trust and love that can exist between humans and animals.

In addition to the on-ground activities, the event featured a **workshop on sustainable practices** for animal welfare. The volunteers discussed how communities could adopt practices such as recycling waste to create animal shelters or using leftover food as feed for strays. The workshop also introduced the concept of community feeders, a shared space where villagers can leave food and water for stray animals daily. These ideas were well-received, with several attendees expressing interest in implementing them in Akbarpur Majra.

The program also aimed to foster inclusiveness by encouraging **collaboration between generations**. Elderly villagers shared traditional practices for coexisting with animals, while younger participants brainstormed innovative solutions to care for strays. This intergenerational dialogue created a shared sense of purpose and commitment, ensuring that the lessons from the day would be passed down and acted upon.

As the event drew to a close, the NSS volunteers organized a **pledge-taking ceremony** where participants promised to treat stray animals with kindness and respect. They pledged to support efforts in providing food, medical care, and shelter to strays, ensuring a safer and more inclusive environment for all living beings. The volunteers also distributed informational pamphlets on animal rights, local veterinary services, and tips for caring for stray animals, empowering the villagers to take sustained action beyond the event.

The program concluded with a heartfelt vote of thanks delivered by the NSS team leader. The volunteers expressed their gratitude to the villagers for their active participation and enthusiasm throughout the event. They reiterated their commitment to continuing such initiatives, ensuring that the bond between humans and animals in Akbarpur Majra strengthens over time. The villagers reciprocated with warm words of appreciation, acknowledging the efforts of the NSS team.
